Jason Lydon is the Congregational Director at the Community Church.

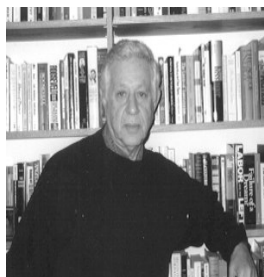


September 17 -- PROF. MARK I. SOLOMON

"Strategies for Building a Progressive Majority"

Mark Solomon is professor emeritus of history at Simmons College and a frequent speaker at CCB. He has traveled and lectured in Europe, Asia & the Caribbean. Prof. Solomon has written scores of articles on African-American history, race & racism, U.S. foreign policy, globalization, and war & peace issues. He has also authored or edited five books--the most recent are *The Cry Was Unity: Communists and African Americans, 1917-1936*. He is a past member of the presidential committee of the World Peace Council and a national co-chair of the Committees of Correspondence for Democracy & Socialism (CCDS).

CCDS held its biennial convention this summer in Chicago; CCB members attended. Prof. Solomon will discuss the strategies developed for a center-left coalition, the 2006 and 2008 elections, and fighting back against the right-wing assault on economic, social, environmental & constitutional rights. He states that a progressive majority would be "an organized, unified, coherent force able to impact the political process and ultimately overcome the dominant corporate politics--connecting constructively with the rest of the world and promoting a domestic culture of democracy & justice."



September 24 -- JANE CROSBY & MARTIN SCHOTZ

"Cuba's Socialist Revolution and the World's Struggle for Peace & Justice"

Jane Crosby is a social worker and therapist, who was an organizer in Maine for Witness for Peace and traveled to Guatemala in defense of human rights. Martin Schotz is a psychiatrist at the South End Community Health Center. Both are longtime activists and have been to Cuba a number of times. In July, 2005, they participated in the Pastors for Peace Friendship caravan, which each year challenges the U.S. economic blockade of Cuba.

Their presentation will contain a multifaceted display on the Cuban reality--including Cuba's history and its developments in education, its contributions to health care & sports throughout the world, its green movement & its political culture, the case of The Cuban Five, and U.S. attempts to destroy the Cuban Revolution.



October 6 -- JONATHAN MCINTOSH

"Indonesia: A Case Study on Corporate Globalization"

Join us as Jonathan McIntosh engages us in conversation about military and economic colonization of Indonesia from 1602 to the present day. Jonathan will present a photo slide show from his experience in Indonesia. Jonathan McIntosh is an award winning photographer, a filmmaker and a community activist living in the Boston/Roxbury area. Jonathan has worked on social justice issues both in the US and with local activists in Jakarta Indonesia.

Jonathan's articles have been featured in *Gateavisa Magazine*, *Dissident Voice*, and *Znet*, and his photos in *Z Magazine*, *Imagine Magazine*, *Indymedia*, *Adbusters* and elsewhere.
